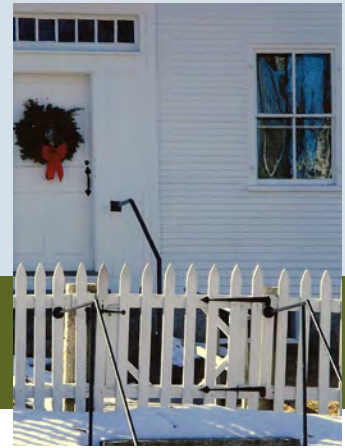

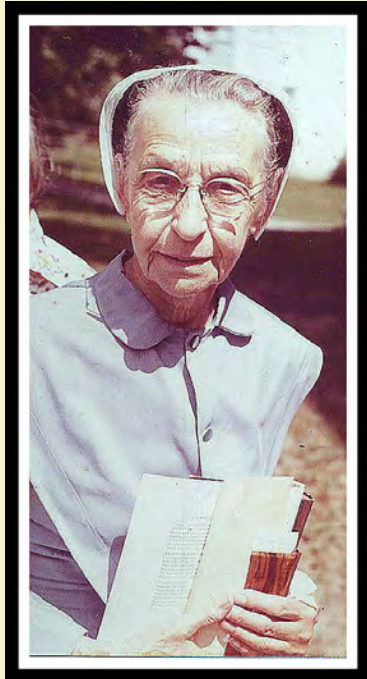

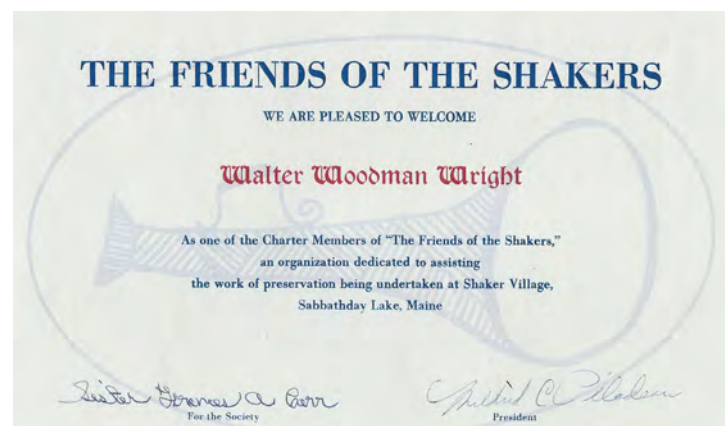

Kathy Moriarty Shaker Friends - Simple Gifts

Kathy has been involved in numerous organizations, including the Shaker Seminar, Boston Area Shaker Study Group and Friends of the Shakers.

Kathy's parents were antique dealers and collectors. Because of their interest, she first learned about the Shakers. The first Shaker museum she visited was Hancock Shaker Village with her family in 1973.

Her interest in things Shaker really started when her father purchased the book, "Religion in Wood" by Edward Deming Andrews and gave it to her to read, while she recuperated from back surgery. At first her interest was the furniture and objects the Shakers made, but after going to Sabbathday Lake Shaker Village in 1978, all of that changed and her focus then became the Shakers themselves.

Her involvement in the past eight years has led to the success of several fundraisers. In 2005-2007 the Friends of the Shakers raised over \$200,000 for the Trust for Public Land. In 2012 Kathy helped raise over \$4,000 for Sr. Frances' 85th birthday that was earmarked for the Library and Museum Acquisition Fund. In the same year she helped raise money for the Shakers to purchase a table from Alfred, ME from the McCue collection. Most recently she was involved in

the Anniversary Campaign for a new library vault.

Kathy's association with the FOS led to our current May and October Work Days. When Roberta Farrell was President of the Friends, she asked the Board Members to coordinate an event. Kathy had organized a work day for the Shaker Seminar the summer before and offered to do the same for the Friends. That was in 1985 and the rest is history.

Kathy served on the Board of the Friends for 23 years as Secretary, Board Member and President. She has been a Christmas Fair volunteer since 1999 and helps at the Shaker booth at the Common Ground Fair.

She is also the author of the children's book, "A Shaker Sampler," published by the Shakers in 1981. A retired classroom teacher, Kathy always thought of children first and when the opportunity arose to create a project for a graduate course at Elmira College, Kathy chose to do something to educate children about the Shakers. She had noticed that resources for children were scarce when teachers brought students on field trips. Her book brings children through the alphabet of Shaker life with illustrations for coloring, and is still available at the Shaker Store.



Ed Brown - Charter Member

Brother Ted Johnson was a key force in the formation of FOS. He was aided by Marius Peladeau, the first President. Peladeau had broad connections in the political and museum worlds of Maine. Br. Ted first mentioned FOS during my first visit to SDL in February 1974. The Friends were formally organized at a conference the Family held in the summer of 1974.

While I was President, the Board took major steps to put the organization on a more permanent and businesslike basis. This included clear delineation of responsibilities through a formal committee system and steps to involve more fully the general membership in the operation of Friends. We also established a more visible and defined fundraising process. Our first big project was painting the office, as suggested by Sister Mildred.

Br. Ted had been expressing concern about protecting the library's assets, which were stored in non-archival conditions, in the central dwelling. He wanted to return the Shaker Schoolhouse from the Merrill farm, where it had been used as an apple storage shed for many years. The building was in poor condition and rapidly deteriorating. The building was tied up in an estate settlement. The apparent way through involved one of the heirs, Blinn Merrill. I had many conversations with him that seemed to lead nowhere in particular. One day, out of the blue, Blinn called and said that the family was willing to donate the building as a memorial to his parents. There is a plaque to this effect on the wall of the schoolroom near the northeast corner.

As you can imagine, Br. Ted was overjoyed. In due course, the Family moved the building and undertook the large task of restoration and adaptation for archival purposes. Tragically, Ted died early in this process. I believe he was granted the satisfaction of seeing the building brought back before his untimely death.

Ed served on the Board of FOS from 1980-2005, was President from 1981-1983 and Treasurer from 1995-2005.

Roger Hall - Charter Member

How has the FOS organization impacted your life and your family's life?
When I first began researching Shaker music in 1971, the first place I visited was Sabbathday Lake. Brother Ted was very helpful in providing manuscripts for me to inspect. That was the beginning of my Shaker music journey, which I wrote about in my pamphlet, *Blended Together: Travels Along The Shaker Music Trail*.

How has Shaker history and your connection to the Shaker Family influenced your life?
It has enriched my life greatly because of my interest in their beautiful music, and over the years I have written articles, presented many lectures and workshops (including at Sabbathday Lake) and been involved with recordings of their music. That all was because of my first visit to Sabbathday Lake and especially my close friendship with Sister Mildred Barker.

Forty years ago, what was the mission and what were your goals for FOS?
As best as I can remember, it was simply to help support the Shakers in any of their needs. My contribution was mainly through researching, lecturing and performing their music. I then became Vice-President in 1981 and I was the editor of *The Clarion* from 1981-1984.

What projects done by FOS are you most proud of?
I'm most proud of saving the Shaker Schoolhouse and moving it from a neighboring farm to be restored as the Shaker Library at SDL. Also saving the land so that it will be preserved as a Shaker site.

Is the current organization how you imagined it would be?
It appears to be more successful than I imagined with many successful projects, including saving the valuable land and helping maintain and restore the buildings, such as the current project for the Shaker Library.

Roger's music edition of the Welcome Song and Farewell Song are used at the Friends' Annual Meetings. He has a new CD, Celestial Praises - A Celebration of Shaker Spirituals, dedicated to Sr. R. Mildred Barker and Sr. Lillian Phelps.

We often say that we are praying for the Shakers. Perhaps this little prayer will help to focus our efforts:

Pray for Vocations to the Shakers

Ever living Father-Mother God, stir up in many hearts the desire to follow in the footsteps of Mother Ann by a selfless life of prayer, work and enthusiasm for the Shaker Christlife at Sabbathday Lake. With your grace, help the Shakers to strive to live the Gospel by giving themselves ever more completely to you, and so make them worthy to receive new members into their fellowship. We ask it in union with the host of Believers who have gone before us and now stand in your presence as witnesses to the Testimony. Amen.

Reflections and the Future

As the Friends of the Shakers of Sabbathday Lake enter their 40th year of offering support to the Shaker Family and their village known as "Chosen Land," it seems an opportune time to reflect on the past and to give a great deal of time and thought to the future, and how we can best be of value to this remarkable place and the people who share so much with us. Thus we have decided to devote considerable time and effort through a small committee to assess where we are and where we should go. This effort will lead to the development of a "Long Term Strategic Plan" that many businesses, public and private, have entered into to ensure that their organizations maintain their focus on their roles.

The essence of a long term strategic plan is to enunciate a vision for the organization (what it ideally wants to look like in the next 3-5 years), develop a mission statement (to explain the ways in which it will try to reach its vision), elicit a statement of core beliefs and then set goals and concrete, detailed action plans.

An important word to remember in developing such an effort is the word "plan." As is true in all aspects of life, few things remain just as they were at any given point, so plans may and should be adjusted according to changing needs. This will be an important aspect of our planning and implementation.

A committee of approximately 12 people has been established, including Brother Arnold, Michael Graham, several past Presidents of the Friends, current Board Members and other members. In order for this group to have input and thoughts from our members, there will be an advisory group who will be asked to comment on the planning as it goes forth. Additionally, a survey of members will be developed to seek further views. The planning committee held its first meeting in mid-February and it is expected that meetings will be held twice a month until July. The plan will be ready for presentation at the August meeting of the Friends.

As we move ahead with this, it is so important for all of us to reflect on how truly fortunate all of the Friends are to be part of this historical, spiritual and environmentally beautiful home of the Shakers. Take time to think about the Dwelling House, the Meeting House, the farm, the animals, the woods and trees, the lake and most of all our Shaker family. We look forward to our continued caring for Chosen Land and all that it represents, and we believe developing a Long Term Strategic Plan will help us accomplish that.

Love is a word that means many things to many people.

My husband, Howard, and I were fortunate to have been able to attend the Friends' Annual Meeting in August at Sabbathday Lake. From the moment we stepped from our car, we were enveloped in a sense of complete tranquility. We felt as though we had "come home."

Thursday, August 6, 1981, was the two hundred seventh anniversary of Mother Ann's landing in this country from England. That evening there was a candlelight service in the Moses Johnson Meeting House. You could feel the love and devotion of these dedicated Shakers flowing from their spirits. It evolves around you and cloaks you like a blanket of love. Try as I would, I found it difficult to stand and give testimony of my inner thoughts. Each time we visit, we encounter a true love transferred between these Believers and their friends and admirers.

It is not easy in these times to find a place where thought for another is closer to your heart than thought for oneself. Here at Sabbathday Lake it is an hour-by-hour, day-by-day occurrence. It makes you feel as though you are sitting in front of a roaring fireplace, but instead of your body being warmed, your soul and spirit are engulfed in the warmth. This is Shaker "love."

The Shakers at Sabbathday Lake are living their lives as their beliefs dictate. This is the last surviving tree in Mother Ann's orchard. I pray that it has strong roots to weather the elements and bears healthy fruit to ripen on its branches for many years to come.
